A Report From our Chair & CEO

At the Community Foundation of Mississauga, we imagine a strong, vital community that has the resources it needs to ensure quality of life for everyone. Mississauga is a vibrant, caring, diverse and growing community, whose needs evolve and change as the city grows in size and complexity. The Community Foundation of Mississauga continues to play a leading role in contributing to the well-being and vibrancy of our community through our essential programs and critical grants. We are addressing needs, filling gaps and solving short and long-term needs in our community.

Over the past few months, the impact of the pandemic has affected the majority of our service providers in Mississauga causing them to look to the Community Foundation to help meet their ever-growing needs. In order to maintain these essential services, the Foundation established the Mississauga Emergency Relief Fund and we will be providing grants to those affected by COVID-19.

We are pleased to present to you our 2019 Annual Report, which details our progress, results and impact.

As a granting foundation, it is critical that we are in sync with our community so that we can make effective grants at the right time to the right program. Working in partnership with our fund holders, donors and our grant programs, last year's grants reflected a diversity in programs across all sectors.

The Foundation's reach can be felt across Mississauga in a multitude of community service organizations in areas such as poverty reduction, the environment, programs for children and youth, health, social services, our vibrant arts and culture sector, newcomers, education, older adults, and the list goes on. In 2019, more than \$1 million in grants were made to 124 vital charitable programs.



Through Endowment and Flow Through grants since our granting began in 2006, grants now total more than \$17 million, a staggering sum with a huge impact.

Grants begin with our fundholders, who have a vision for the causes they care about and we pay tribute to them for their careful consideration of the needs of our community when they determine grants. With great concern for the future of Mississauga and its citizens, they seed, nurture and support a broad range of initiatives that are essential to the wellbeing of our community. We are pleased to welcome to our fundholders two new endowment funds: Julian Martinez de Hoz Jesus Cares Education Fund and the Webber Family Fund.

Our cornerstone events provide our Foundation with critical funding, and 2019 saw us bring together our community of friends, donors and supporters for these events. At our Speaker's Series event we welcomed Jeff Adams, champion Paralympic athlete who revealed how focus, determination, and spirit are the keys to achieving "gold medal" dreams. The Fore Community Golf Tournament was a great success held at Piper's Heath for a day of fun and fellowship. The 7th Annual Dancing with Mississauga Stars Gala featured community Stars who worked tirelessly to create an evening of great entertainment and fundraising. Our thanks go to the Stars Jamie Cortez, Ian Dawe, Joty Pannu, David Shaw, Shelley White and the 2019 Mirrorball Trophy winner, John Digby.

We continue to focus on our community leadership activities. Aligned with thoughtful insights from our 2018 Vital Signs research on community health, safety and wellness, we held a Vital Conversation to further explore Physical Activity, Health & Wellbeing. Joining us were a panel of community thought leaders: Dr. Lawrence Loh, Dr. lan Zenlea, and Marilyn Knox.

The Pendle Award for Philanthropy honours volunteerism and philanthropy at the Community Foundation. This year, for the first time, we presented two awards, one for an individual and the second for a corporation. The recipients of the awards were Cliff Silveira and Keyser Mason Ball (KMB Law), both long-time friends, volunteers and supporters who have embodied the award's spirit that philanthropy can truly transform our community.

The Community Foundation is fortunate to have the support and involvement of its Corporate Partners, who provide critical sustaining financial support. You also provide important advice, volunteer involvement and professional expertise that are vital to our Foundation as we expand our impact for the benefit of our broader community.

As we close, we pay tribute to our volunteers. The theme of this year's report is "Imagine" and we know that if it were not for a group of community minded citizens who advocated for our foundation to be established 19 years ago, we may not have been able to make the impact that we have had for almost two decades. We couldn't imagine a Mississauga without the Community Foundation. Jingtamok 2019: Indigenous Day at Riverwood

The annual Jingtamok: Indigenous Day at Riverwood is a hopeful event that builds openhearted relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people, and in 2019 this was made possible through a \$10,000 grant from the Hazel McCallion Fund for Arts, Culture and Heritage. The goals of Indigenous Day at Riverwood are to build community connections, raise awareness of Indigenous ways of relating to the land, recognize the Indigenous heritage of the land now called Riverwood, and to support the goals of reconciliation by bringing people together in a setting that recognizes the important historic contribution Indigenous peoples have made to the heritage of this region.

The 2019 event opened on the Chappell Lawn at Riverwood Park with an opening prayer and welcome by The Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation Elder Vivian Recollet and Jingtamok Coordinator. The Welcome Song was performed by Tabitha Shurgold, The Indigenous Network, with Women Hand Drummers. An Honour Song included drummers from the Big Drum, including the All Nations Juniors and Kevin Myran. Jingle Dress Healing Songs and Dancing for the Land and Community were beautifully demonstrated by Briana Olsen, Danni McKenna and Fancy Shawl, and Cheryle Jacobs.



The park was filled with the splendor of indigenous tradition. Medicine and Historical Walks by Phil Cote and an Inuit Crafts and Culture talk by Naulaq Le Drew wrapped up the successful day.

Indigenous Day at Riverwood has been received with growing enthusiasm since its inception in 2017. Guided by the careful hands of Jane New, the Enabling Garden Specialist of The Riverwood Conservancy, the event has seen a steady increase in attendance with more than 350 attendees at Jingtamok 2019: Indigenous Day at Riverwood. Every year sees more and more visitors enjoying the opportunity to learn about Indigenous culture and ways of knowing, guided by Indigenous Elders, Knowledge Keepers and cultural presenters including drummers and jingle dancers, thanks to the generous support of the Hazel McCallion Fund for Arts, Culture and Heritage at the Community Foundation of Mississauga.

The day was well received with positive accolades from the day's attendees. Said one guest: "What an amazing day @ yourriverwood Jingtamok... the highlight was hearing from an Inuit Knowledge Keeper, stories from her fifteen years living traditionally on Baffin Island were such a gift. Miigwech to all organizers."

The Salvation Army Mississauga Community & Family Services



Adventure Summer Camp

In 2019 The Salvation Army Mississauga Community & Family Services received funding from the Pendle Fund in support of its annual Adventure Summer Camp. This grant allowed the Salvation Army to make the dream of camp a reality for a greater number of children, allowing them to fund 60 children's registration including sleeping bags, board, meals and activities.

When children attend the Adventure Camp they experience more than a nice vacation. With the commitment and character of trained counsellors these campers were guided in a positive direction. Campers have the opportunity to increase their self-confidence and self-esteem, make new friends and develop life and leadership skills such as independence, teamwork and goal-setting. When some of the campers are older they will be able to work at the camp and influence other children.

The program benefits children and youth who come from disadvantaged and low-income families who have limited access to recreation programs and similar outlets. As well, children whose families are enrolled in their food bank and other support programs are able to sign up for the Summer Camp free of charge.

Alena is an example of a child who became a camp leader and wrote, "In my leadership course, which is part of the camping program, we made and sold crafts to support a children's home in Africa with books and funds for building repair. Love and compassion is a big part of learning at Salvation Army camps." This year, Alena looks forward to completing the leadership program and then joining the staff. "I want to be a person who helps children thrive and develop..."

According to a follow-up survey, 80% of Adventure Campers would like to return to camp this summer. Within a short, concentrated time frame, camp can change a life.

"My counsellors are really nice and helpful," says Logan.

"And the food is good. I get ice cream for dessert and can sit wherever I want. I have new friends and I like that."

"Camp challenges Logan," says his mother Tanya. "His swimming has improved, crafts have boosted his creativity and he loves morning exercise. If he was at home he'd be playing video games."



"Attending camp from a young age set me up for success as a camp leader. And as a leader in a setting where many children come from broken homes I've learned better how to comfort people who are hurting or experiencing challenging times."

Senior Smiles Project

It's just another day "at the office" for registered mobile dental hygienist Joanna as she attends to seniors' teeth during her monthly clinic at the Active Adult Centre of Mississauga (AACM). Starting in August 2019, the Active Adult Centre of Mississauga ran 12 oral care clinic days at its central-Mississauga location. So far, 72 older adults were treated through its Senior Smiles project, with an expected 90 more appointments in the program's duration. These were made possible through the Community Foundation's Pendle Fund. Clients received a free cleaning, polishing, a visual oral assessment, and, if needed, a fluoride treatment and temporary fillings. An education in proper oral care and referrals to additional dental care resources topped off their appointments through this well-subscribed and highly-rated program serving low-income seniors without access to regular dental care or insurance.

The Active Adult Centre sees the difference that this care is making in the oral health of its clients first hand. "Overall, the program is having a visible positive impact on the seniors... [They] are very appreciative and have many dental needs."

"Without this funding we could not hope to run this vital program in our community where the need is great. It's clear to us that Senior Smiles is making a real difference to the people we're serving," says Linda Salb, Executive Director of the AACM. "Our sincere thanks to The Community Foundation of Mississauga and The Pendle Fund for investing in this important local initiative that's positively affecting the ongoing health of seniors in Mississauga."





Food Fit Program

Since its inception the Community Foundation of Mississauga has generously provided funding to many programs offered in the Learning Kitchen at Eden Food for Change. In 2019, the support continued through a grant of \$3,000 from the Children & Youth Grant Stream.

One of Eden's more impactful programs is its Food Fit education and support program in partnership with Trillium Health Partners. The program focuses its efforts on the belief that early investment in children's health can greatly improve long-term health and well-being. The Food Fit program is an intentional response to Peel Region's above average child obesity and type 2 diabetes rates.

Food Fit focuses on food skills education for families with children and adolescents who are experiencing, or at risk for, serious medical and psychological consequences associated with obesity. Two registered dietitians and a team of volunteers from Eden Food for change and Trillium Health Partners, togeather support families in making changes for a healthier lifestyle, including getting more active, eating healthy, and getting the right amount of sleep. The program offers family-based behavioural treatment through individualized care, group education, food skills development and physical activity sessions.

Eden Food For Change hosts the program in its Food Bank and Learning Kitchen facilities, providing education spaces, food skills training for staff and food support. The amazing program team leads the children and adolescents and their families with great energy and care. Participants love the hands-on approach and the delicious rewards of healthy eating created by themselves at the end of the evening.

Toronto Wildlife Centre

Wild Mission Mississauga: Helping Sick and Injured Wildlife

Toronto Wildlife Centre has been admitting wildlife patients from Mississauga ever since they opened their facility 26 years ago. Since then they have provided high quality care to thousands of animals, giving each one the best chance of survival and recovery. From common species to threatened ones, healthy animals returned to their homes in the wild could continue to play their important roles in the ecosystem, and contribute to their populations.

In 2019, the Pendle Fund granted \$12,500 to the Toronto Wildlife Centre (TWC). The funding ensured that sick and injured wild animals admitted to Toronto Wildlife Centre from Mississauga received medical treatment and rehabilitation. While the cost for each patient varied based on species and condition, the overall expenditure included support for wildlife veterinarians to conduct assessments, determine treatment plans and deliver surgery, medicines, surgical supplies, and external diagnostic and test services. Food, rehabilitation and socialization are also funded as the team readies the animals for release back into the wild.



Last year, 143 wildlife patients belonging to 52 species from Mississauga were admitted for treatment, with more expected throughout the year. The Rescue Team came to the aid of animals in situations where it was not possible or safe for members of the public or other organizations to do so. For example, a mallard whose neck and bill were painfully entangled in plastic wire in the middle of a pond at Kariya Park, and a snowy owl trapped in a cooling tower of a building.

The Mississauga community has come to know the Toronto Wildlife Centre as a critical resource in the rescue, treatment and release of injured animals, and the Centre is pleased that many new Mississauga volunteers have joined their efforts.

Wildlife care is cost-intensive, so the Centre must limit the number of patients admitted each year. The Pendle Fund grant ensured that up to 100 wild patients from Mississauga could receive high quality care, and Mississauga residents who sought help for these wild animals were confident they were in the expert and compassionate hands of the Toronto Wildlife Centre.






